Datasets THE COMMITMENT CREDIBILITY OF PUBLIC-EMPLOYEE PENSIONS

To assess the causes and consequences of variation in pensions, I constructed a new dataset including plan, political, and personnel variables from 103 funds in all fifty states from 2001-2016. Included among the data is a variable for the politicization of funds’ management boards, the percentage of retired and active employees on boards, as well as a proxy variable for the retirement rate for public employees in each fiscal year. The creation of both of those variables required examining the actuarial reports of all plans in my data for all years. I merged this with other actuarial information from Boston College’s [Public Plans Database](#).
